The rationing of the troops of the German Luftwaffe was in principle the concern of the Army. At stated intervals the Intendants (administrative officials) of the Luftwaffe divisions, corps, (organized ground force troops) etc., reported their ration strengths to the Army Intendants of their district. Supplies for Luftwaffe troops were generally received from Army distributing points. This general rule could be broken by establishing intermediate distributing points (under the control of Army or Luftwaffe officials), if the distance between the Army distributing point and the Luftwaffe troops became too great. There were no difficulties in this respect.

The special ration requirements for flying personnel were generally met by the Army. The special ration for the flying personnel (take-off and flight ration) was turned over to the Flieger corps and Flieger divisions (flying personnel), for direct issue to the flying units (always for a rather long period of time) without going through the distributing points. This worked satisfactorily.

In order to give greater variety to the fare of flying personnel
in warmer egions and seasons by the issue of fresh meat and fresh
vegetables, refrige ator planes (Junkers) were used with good results,

The paring of Luftwaffe troops was also the responsibility of the Army. The necessary funds, broken down into amounts for disbursement to pe sonnel and all other purposes, were claimed by the Air Force District Intendants at the Army finance office and were distributed to the troops by the proper a countable offices of the corps, divisions etc. (paymasters).

The clothing of the Luftwaffe was collected by the Intendents of the corps, divisions, etc., on the basis of reports submitted by the troops, and was then reported by the Administrative Headquarters of the Air Force of the District of Rome to the Berlin Reich Air Ministry (Administrative Office). The latter, after a check, directed that the clothing be supplied to the Luftwaffe clothing officers, who proceeded with the dispatch of the shipment to the consignees designated by the district Air Force Intendents. No problems of any consequence ever came to my notice. Clothing which was not immediately needed was stored in a clothing warehouse in Northern Italy. This was under the Air Force District Administrative Command, as were also extensive clothing repairs (location forgotten).

The <u>supply of fuel</u> was solely the responsibility of the Army.

As coal trains arrived they were turned over, usually entire and on a quota basis, to the Air Force District Headquarters (Administration), which undertook the further distribution to the corps, divisions, etc., of the Luftwaffe. <u>Office supplies</u> were handled the same way. The problems involving supply of <u>billet equipment</u> were insignificant for for reasons of transport.

Then rations for the German Luftwaffe (air force) troops was principally the duty of the Army. The intendants of the air forces divisions and corps reported their ration strengths to the army intendant, proper for their area, in determined time periods. Issue of rations for air forces troops principally from Army issue stations. This principle could be broken with a to great a distance between Army issue station and air forces troop by establishment of sub-issue stations (under the direction of Army or Ait forces personnel). No difficulties resulted with this system.

The special ration demands of the flying personnel generally were met by the Army. The special ration for the flying personnel (starting and flight ration) was given to the air force corps and the parachute divisions directly for distribution to the flying units, always for a longer period, without insertion of the issue stations. This has proved itself.

To vary the diet of the flying personnel with fresh meat and fresh vegetables in warmer regions and times refigerating machines (Kühl-Ju's) were use with excellent success, because the Army as carrier of the ration service naturally adjusted its supply primarily to the rationing of the grounforces, but which not always corresponded to the demands of the flying personnel.

The money supply for the air forces troops too was the duty of the Army.

The Intendants of the air force administrative commands requested the money requirements - divided into personnel and material expenditures - from the Army finance and responsibly distributed them over the intendants of the corps, divisions, etc, to the troops (Pay master).

The clothing of the air forces was reported by the intendant of the corps, divisions, etc., on the basis of troop reports and was repoted by the air force administrative command (administration) % / Rome to the Reich Arir ministry (administration office) Berlin. This office assigned, after


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examination, the clothing to be assupplied, to air forces clothing offices, which carried out the shipment to the adresses, determined by the intendant of the air force administrative command. Substantial difficulties did not become known. Clothing not immediately needed was stored in a clothing depot in the north of Italy, which depot was subordinated to the air force administrative command, the same with repair clothing for larger repairs. (Locality not known any more)

The supply with heating materials was completely the job of the Army. Arriving coal trains were usually transferred closed and proportionally to the air force administrative command (administration), which undertook the subdivision to the corps, divisions, etc., of the air forces. This also was the case with office materials. The supply of billetting equipment was only of insignificant type, already for reasons of transportation.
